# **National Thayer Family Reunion 2023**




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The Thayer Families Association was founded in 1991 to further the quest for the family's heritage. Spurred on by family historian and genealogist Patricia Thayer Muno, the TFA has thrived and sponsors a national family reunion every two years. After a COVID hiatus, the 2020 reunion was held July 6-9, 2023 and 67 family members from across the country returned to their roots in Braintree, Massachusetts.

The Thayers began their American story in 1637 when the first of three young Thayer men from Thornbury, England made their way to Braintree. From that time until today over 78,000 Thayers descended from those early arrivals and can call themselves "somehow cousins".

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


#### Where our American roots began...

In addition to the first Thaver boys from Thornbury, England, who settled in Braintree and who were the progenitors of our Thayer clan, another tribute to our line - General Sylvanus Thayer was born in Braintree and graduated as valedictorian from both Dartmouth College and West Point, where he was Superintendent from 1817-1833 and established traditions and policies still in use, including the values of honor and responsibility, strict mental and physical discipline, the demerit system, summer encampment, high academic standards, and the requirement that cadets maintain outstanding military bearing and appearance at all



Sylvanus (9 June 1785 - 7 Sept 1872) was the son of Nathanie Thayer, who was a gentleman farmer and built the house (above) in 1720, and his wife Dorcas Faxon. In 1793, at the age of 8, Thayer was sent to live with his uncle Azariah Faxon and attend school in Washington, NH Ten years later he matriculated at Dartmouth College, graduating as valedictorian of his class However, he never gave the valedictory address at Dartmouth because of his appointment to West Point by President Thomas Jefferson. Thayer graduated after a single year. His interest and expertise in engineering foreshadowed the bulk of his later career, and explains why he put so much time, energy, and money into developing strong engineering programs.



Conceived in 1871 at the bequest of General Sylvanus Thayer, known as the father of the United States Military Academy at West Point, and founder of the Thayer School of Engineering at Dartmouth College, the Academy was established in 1877. The 34-acre campus is situated in the heart of Braintree and consists of eight buildings and 54 classrooms.

Its rigorous college preparatory curriculum, top rating, and small class size (average 15) command an annual tuition of approximately \$36,575 for its 688 private students who attend the day school.

Plimoth Patuxet's full-scale reproduction of the tall ship that brought the Pilgrims to Plymouth in 1620 is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

You will no doubt be immediately struck by how small the ship seems particularly in the 'tween decks, where the passengers were confined. How could 102 people, including three pregnant mothers, have survived more than ten weeks in a space this size?

Historic Patuxet is where we will learn about the Native peoples who have lived here for over 12,000 years. The Patuxet were a Native American band of the Wampanoag tribal confederation. They were among the first Native Americans encountered by European settlers in the region in the early 17th century. Most of the population subsequently died of epidemic infectious diseases.

Contemporary interpreters discuss the 17th-century ways of life of a culture that continues to thrive today.

We Asked For Their Help







We met at the **Thaver Public** Library before heading out with our guides to tour the **Sylvanus Thayer** House in Braintree, MA.











A 9-cent stamp honoring Sylvanus Thaver, considered the father of technical education in America for his pioneering reforms at the United States Military Academy, was issued June 7, 1985, in his birthplace of Braintree.

Back to our Thayer roots: Nathaniel Thayer, the nephew of Richard Thayer, settled at Taunton, Bristol, Massachusetts in 1660. He was the nephew of Richard Thayer, the immigrant of 1641, who settled in Braintree, Massachusetts, where his brother Thomas had already settled in 1637. From those three Thaver men grew at least 78,000 Thayers who are all "somehow cousins", according to Thayer genealogist Patricia Thayer Muno.

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# We Toured Thayer Academy -- inspiring students since 1877











Enjoying campus life: Located in historic Braintree, Thayer Academy was founded in 1877, in accordance with the will of General Sylvanus Thayer, a native of Braintree and a "somehow cousin" to all Thayers. Sylvanus led a distinguished life as a soldier, engineer, educator, and philanthropist. He is also known as the "Father of West Point". 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


Miscellaneous games and raffles provided winning opportunities throughout the weekend.
