From 18 Apr 1412 to 27 July 1448, John Buncker was the vicar of the Houghton Regis Parish, Beds.

The photo is the cemetery where our earliest known Beds Bunkers were buried [probably Roger, d ca1515]; there are no gravestones with the name Bunker on them.

In 1220, a church at Chalgrave, Bedfordshire, was dedicated. This church, with many renovations and possibly a total rebuild, still stands today. John Bunker was buried [at Chalgrave] on 27 Mar 1609. Mrs. Bunker Dead

PANGUITCH [UT], Feb. 18. - Mrs. EMILY ABBOTT BUNKER died February 7 at the home of her daughter. She had suffered three years from a fractured leg which, with the infirmities of old age, caused her death.

Mrs. Bunker was born in Dansville, NY, September 19, 1827. She joined the church in 1841 and moved to Nauvoo, [IL] with her parents.

She was married to EDWARD BUNKER, February 9, 1946, Elder John Taylor performing the ceremony.

Her husband enlisted in the Mormon Battalion and left his wife to defend his country. When her husband returned, two years later, she was the mother of a child born shortly after he had left with his comrades.

In 1850 they came to Utah and settled in "Dixie." They moved to Santa Clara, where Mr. Bunker was bishop for a number of years. In 1877 they moved to Bunkerville, in 1901 to Mexico where Mr. Bunker died.

In 1907 Mrs. Bunker returned to Utah. She was the mother of eleven children, five boys and six girls. These, with 66 grandchildren, 67 great grandchildren and two great-great grandchildren are the number of her posterity.

Colonel Bunker Committed Suicide

TOLEDO, March 22 - Colonel Henry S. Bunker, a prominent and widely-known attorney, was found dead in his office in this city. He had shot himself. The dead man was a veteran of the Civil War [96th Inf., Co. C & Co. S. -Sgt.] and was prominent in G. A. R. and Masonic circles. He had a wide state acquaintance from 20-years' service in the Ohio National Guard and from which he only recently retired. Colonel Bunker declined the appointment of adjutant general, which was recently tendered by Governor Nash. It is stated that he was embarrassed financially, but not to a large extent.

A Mysterious Case

TOLEDO, March 22 - Colonel Henry S. Bunker, a prominent attorney, was found dead in his office vesterday. There was a bullet hole in the back of his head. It is not known whether it is murder or suicide.

The doors leading to the office were locked. The coroner is investigating. Bunker was seen on the street one hour before he met death. The suicide theory is strong. The fingers and thumb were blackened. He was an exemplary man. There was no financial trouble so far as is known.

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President's Notes

Dear Cousins,

Herein follows the annual plea regarding the BFA finances. Or, rather, the lack thereof. Based on the officer's reports on pages 2592 and 2593 of this Bunker Banner, our expenses are approximately \$250 above our income. And, based on our current membership, there is not a prospect of breaking even. Our options: raise the cost of dues to cover the cost of the newsletter; print fewer issues of the Banner (two or three a year instead of four); or use some of the funds in the savings to cover the constant deficit. These funds consist of the Annabelle Moore Scholarship which was specifically gifted to the BFA for a scholarship, and another fund which was specifically earmarked for capital expenditures (The Frank Bunker fund). Originally, interest rates were such that the annual interest was enough to cover the annual scholarship award. As you know, interest rates have been pretty pitiful in the 21st century. Now the annual award is taken directly from the fund. At this time, the Annabelle Moore Scholarship fund is close to depletion. I am unsure if we would even be legally allowed to use the capital fund for anything other than capital expenditures. We need to make some changes, or I fear we will need to dissolve our society. We cannot constantly operate in the red.

Please share your thoughts/ideas regarding solving our financial challenges.

Robert S. Bunker Affidavit

The New York Journal of Commerce of Thursday, contains the following particulars of the death of Ex-President Adams' eldest son, who left this city a few days since for Washington, on a visit to his father. Mr. Adams was a member of the Common Council, and for some time past had been troubled with occasional fits of melancholy. *Boston Gazette*

MELANCHOLY EVENT - George Washington Adams, Esq. of Boston, was yesterday a passenger on board the steam packet *Benjamin Franklin*, from Providence to New York ; but on her arrival at the wharf this morning, could not be found Mr. Adams, we learn, was up during most of the night, and when Capt. Bunker came on deck at 6 o'clock, was observed to be talking in a loud voice at the Clerk's window. The circumstances excited little the surprise of Capt. B. but at that moment meeting with an accident himself, he thought no more of the matter.

Soon after, a passenger happening to pass near Mr. Adams – "What did you say, Sir ?" said Mr. A. starting from a leaning posture on some baggage ; "Nothing at all. Sir" replied the gentlemen. Ah! I understood you to say that Mr. Adams had jumped overboard." He then spoke to the other gentleman, and said the passenger had drawn up a slanderous paper against him, and had all signed it.

These strange circumstances produced some conversation among the passengers who knew them, but the apprehensions were too late—Mr. Adams was not on board. His hat was found near the verge of the upper deck. 2584 Every effort was made in accordance with the melancholy apprehensions entertained—but the night was dark, and nothing could be discovered. The boat was by this time in the East River. Since the unfortunate, event took place, several circumstances have been recollected by the passengers, which seem plainly to indicate that Adams was laboring under mental derangement ; and it was doubtless in this state of mind when he committed the fatal act.

The following is an affidavit made by Captain Bunker, in relation to the unfortunate occurrence on board the *B. Franklin* :

City of New York. Robert S. Bunker, commander of the steam-ship *Benjamin Franklin*, being duly sworn, saith,

That the said vessel arrived at the foot of Berkman Street this morning about half-past 5 o'clock. That among the passengers was George Washington Adams. That about 3 o'clock this morning off Throgg's Neck, in Long Island Sound, (*as deponent presumes*) the said George W. Adams, the being on the upper deck, (*as despondent infers and believes from his hat being found there*) accidentally fell overboard. The deponent further saith, that he heard the said G. W. Adams (*as he believes*) talking early this morning very earnestly to himself, and although deponent under the impression that the said G. W. Adams was partially deranged in mind. Yet he believes that from the position in which the hat was found on the upper deck, it was more than probable that he fell overboard from the upper deck of the steam-ship *Franklin*, and was drowned.

A Boston newspaper reports the marriage in Falmouth of **Capt. Henry C. Bunker**, of Nantucket to Miss Adeline Calotte.

The newsprint also listed marriages in Boston, Charlestown, West Cambridge, Worcester, Billerica, New Bedford, Sherburne, Bridgeport, Manchester, Nantucket, and New York.

Bunker** [John Morris], between two and three years of age, died in Falmouth (Mass.) on the 8th inst., in five or six hours after taking poison mixed with molasses, for killing flies. Several deaths among children have [taken] place this season, from the same cause, and we trust parents will hereafter be more careful of how they use such mixture.

Henry Chase Bunker

Copy of a letter from Henry Chase Bunker to his grandson and namesake Henry Chase Bunker, [Jr.].

"Falmouth, April 30, 1865. My dear Grandson: I was much pleased with your last letter and am ready to answer your question, which is the propriety of going to Sea or remaining on the land, in the first place I will tell you why I went to Sea. In the first instance I contracted the fever of going to Sea in New York, because I was surrounded by a Seagoing community, my Father had followed the Seas from a boy and was Master at the time of his shipwreck and loss. I must of been about three or four years old I don't remember him, my mother soon commenced keeping boarders from Nantucket most of them Ship Masters and in 1805 or 6 I got the fever and shipped Cabin boy with Capt. Wm. Chase, a good friend and cousin to my mother. His wife was taken sick and he left the Ship and went to Nantucket to see her, the Ship took another Captain and sailed for the Straits. In the meantime, I had an Uncle that arrived home and advised Mother to keep me at home as I was too young to go to Sea he said. Capt. Chase returned from Nantucket and soon got another Ship, they wanted a boy as Cabin boy, I went on board as I thought in that high station and stuck by the Ship until the day of sailing when Capt. Chase said to me, Henry, I want you to go up get a Carman and bring down my bed and Chest. I said to him shall I bring down my things too, his answer

was, I am sorry to tell you Henry your mother with the advice of your Uncle thinks you had better not go. I choked and choked. I was too much of a man to drop a tear. I soon had the carman at the door and the bed and chest in the cart and soon alongside of the Ship without dropping a tear. She cast off and was soon out of sight. I could now relieve myself by a copious flood of tears. I sat down on a pair of steps and soon cried out all the Ship fever I had in me. I really believe I had nearly the sympathy of the whole City for many of the passersby hearing my sobs would stop and ask what is the matter my boy or what is the matter my little man, my universal answer was nothing not wishing to enlighten my audience as I said before I cried all the fever out of me, and in the time of the long Embargo we moved to Nantucket and in 1811 I was bound for seven years to an apprentice to learn the art, trade and mystery of a Cooper. In 1812 the War came on with Britain, in 1815 we had given John Bull such a licking that he was glad to make PEACE with the Yankees. I now had a trade and had negotiated with my Master for three years of my time, so I was free when I was 18, now the question came up what shall I do, go to Sea NO, the fever was completely eradicated. It was then I wanted some friend or rich relation to say to me I will set you up in the Coopering business, but I had no such friend. I was soon offered a birth [berth] as Cooper of a Ship. I dreaded to think of it, but I pondered it in my mind for some days and finally shipped as cooper of the old *Essex.* Well now by dear boy I am coming to the point. You see what a great difference there is in our conditions. I was poor indeed with no Father no rich friends. You on the other hand have Father. Mother. brothers and sisters and no doubt your Father has some good friends around him, he don't want you to go to Sea nor your Mother nor your Grandfather nor your Grandmother. I should therefore advise you to listen to and in a few years after this cursed Slaveholders Rebellion is wiped out of the Commerce of that City with the advantages of the Pacific Rail Road will be quite equal to the City of New York, therefore I shall advise you under your circumstances never to go to Sea, but stick to your School, get a good education and by the time you are twenty one or before you will never be sorry that you took up with your best friends advice ... We are well at this time. Aunt Lizzie talks of leaving here in June. Lue is a good boy and is doing well and is a great help to me in farming and other little jobs. Your Grandmother joins me in a deal of love to you all. Father, Mother, sisters, and brothers, remember me to Charley Bassett. Write me some and say that you have concluded to abandon the idea of ever being a sailor. Believe me as ever. Your affectionate Grandfather." RECORD

On 17 Nov 1828 the whaling ship Uncas (400 tons, built at Fairhaven in 1828, owner Elijah Swift) of Falmouth, Capt. Henry C. Bunker, sailed for the Pacific Ocean. She returned on 15 Jul 1831 with 3468 bbl. of sperm oil, valued at \$88,000.

On 9 Nov 1831 the whaling ship Uncas of Falmouth, Capt. Henry C. Bunker, sailed for the Pacific. She returned in 1835 with 2900 bbl. of sperm oil. Among other records carved on the rocks of Chatham Bay, Cocoa Island, Pacific Ocean, is "Ship Uncas, H.C. Bunker Falmouth Sept 23, 1833."

On 25 Oct 1836 the whaling ship Hobomok (412 tons, owner Elijah Swift) of Falmouth, Capt. Henry C. Bunker, sailed for the Pacific. She returned on 7 Nov 1839 with 200 bbl of sperm oil and 1200 bbl of whale oil.

On 19 May 1848 the whaling ship Daniel Webster (336 tons, owner Benjamin Coffin) of Nantucket, Capt. Henry C. Bunker, sailed for the Pacific. She returned on 17 May 1852 with 230 bbl of sperm oil and 2500 lb. of whale bone Capt. Bunker came home sick. Bette - 13 Oct 2008

What? Another Baseball Pitcher?

Richard James Bunker, b April 5, 1935 Norwood, MA; d April 3, 2016; Pitcher; Bats: Left; Throws: Left; Height: 5'11"; Weight: 165; Career: 1956-1961.

Dick Bunker compiled a career record of 54 wins and 46 losses and a 3.29 ERA in his 170-game pitching career with the Schenectady Blue Jays, Miami Marlins, Buffalo Bisons, Chattanooga Lookouts, and Indianapolis Indians. He began playing during the 1956 season and last took the field during the 1961 campaign.

Parade

A meeting of fireman was held last evening at the Perseverance Hose House, composed of the Committee of Arrangements for the Fireman's Parade, at which the final report was made, and other business of interest transacted. Among the principal items were the following:-

PHILADELPHIA - A communication was received from the Mayor, in response to a request presented [to] him in which he would be pleased to review the parade from such point on Broad Street as the Committee might designate.

Application was made by a printing establishment for the privilege of having a wagon containing a printing press placed in the line. The communication stated that there would be thrown off a large edition of the paper, containing editorials, local items, &c. A similar application was also received from a Market Street tailor, asking the favor of placing in the parade a car, from which his goods can be exhibited. The applications were approved.

On motion it was decided that the Chief Marshall and Chief Engineer shall have power to take such companies from the line, on the day of the parade, in case of fire, as they deem proper, for the purpose of extinguishing fires that may occur.

The meeting then adjourned.

Additional NOTE: The Fire Museum in Phila answered my query; they have no info on Weccacoe personnel or my gr-gr-grandfather Henry Bunker (c1814-1866) i.e., was he a Weccacoe Fireman or an honorary Marshall in the parade? The museum said, "I believe the position of Marshall of the Parade was an honorary one. At that time period the Fire Marshall was a Police position."

Estate of Joseph Bunker

Joseph Bunker of Mt. Desert, Maine, died intestate (without a will) and his sons Benaiaih and Joseph were named administrators of the estate. Both boys were listed as mariners. The inventory of the estate was dated 5 July 1822 and is a good example of the things people owned in those days.

INVENTORY of the estate included homestead with one house and a barn, 1 ox, 3 cows, 1 yearling, 2 swine, 14 sheep. Household goods: 1 feather bed, 2 pillows, bed sted, under bed & cond, 2 bed quilts & rag coverlet, 4 blankets, 1 sheet, 2 pillowcases, 3 Kittles, tea Kittle, 1 pr. dogs, shovel and tongs (these are for fireplaces), tin ware, table & tea spoons iron, crokery ware, eathern wares, 4 old chairs, one old beaureau, two tables & light stand, one chest, sive, ferkins and pails, churn, piggin, one wheel (spinning wheel), 10 gall molases and keg, one compass, chain gun & sickle, harow, grind stone, bag, sythe tackle, pitch fork, old Iron. Wearing apparel: surtuit, two pr. trousers, 3 vests, shirt & hankerchief, Jacoats, 7 pr. stockings, 4 yds. cloth, 12 yds cloth.

One half of the Schooner called the Sea Flower, 1 spy glass, 1 Bible and other books. The house and barn were valued at \$507. The rest of the estate was valued at \$439.10, which included \$266 for the half interest in the Schooner named Sea Flower.

(Words are implied as spelled in the court document). JOSEPH⁵ (1982 BunGen p.53) D-48

Historian NOTE: Joseph had a chain gun and sickle as well as "sythe tackle" whatever those implements might be. A sickle with a chain and weight attached was a weapon in the 1820s. A scythe was used then and today for cutting grass/hay and other things, but I can find nothing about a "sythe tackle." A sickle was a knife used to cut crops, etc. but had a smaller blade than a scythe.

Joseph had 16 yards of cloth. This was common in those days when nearly all clothing was made at home at home. A pair of trousers takes about two yards of cloth, and a longsleeved shirt also takes about two yards.

A woman's dress in those days could take anywhere from five to fifteen yards of cloth depending upon the style and width of the skirt.

Joseph had a Bible and other books which were not named. Obviously, he could read at a time when about half the population could not.

Joseph's estate was sold at auction for \$ 433.05. He owed *\$512.44 in debt. Estate costs totaled \$ 105.83 including the* final bill of \$ 9.34 from Doctor K. Kitridge for Joseph's last sickness and \$ 3.50 from Ruth Staples for attendance at Joseph's last sickness.

The funeral charge was \$ 10.

The value of the dollar in 1822 was approximately \$26 compared to today's value. However, the cost of many things today is more than the variation.

Can you imagine paying \$260 for a funeral today, or buying a house and barn for only \$13,000?

That the especial thanks of the Corporation of the City: of New-York, be presented to the North River Steam Boat Company, for the highly liberal manner in which they placed at their disposal of the Corporation, the boats of that Company, for the reception of the Marquis La Fayette: And that the Corporation of the City of New-York, in behalf of the city, take a particular pleasure in acknowledging publicly, the continued acts of service rendered by the Company, at great inconvenience and expense, to promote the wishes of the Common Council in relation to their distinguished guest. And they hope that services thus liberal, gratuitous, and patriotic will be duly appreciated by an enlightened community.

RESOLVED, 'That the thanks of the Board be given to Charles Rhind, Esq. the agent of the North River Steam Boat Company, for his constant, unremitted, and efficient efforts, to give the finest and most imposing effect to the munificent and public-spirited appropriation of the boats, for the honorable purpose to which they were applied.

RESOLVED, That the thanks of the Board be presented to the captains and crews of the North River Steam Boat Company, for their uniform hospitality, kindness, and attention.

RESOLVED, That the resolutions passed by the different insurance offices of this city; "that the detention at Staten Island, of the vessel in which the Marquis La Fayette might arrive, (if found necessary by the Corporation) should in no wise effect the insurance," was in a spirit of liberality and disinterestedness, highly honorable to them, and entitles them to the thanks of this Common Council.

RESOLVED, That Major General Morton be requested to return to the troops on duty, at the reception of the Marquis La Fayette, the thanks of this Board, for the promptness with which their services were reinforced in honour of one of our most beloved and distinguished veterans of the revolution.

RESOLVED, That the preceding resolutions be entered upon the records of the Common Council - that the Clerk of this Board communicate to copies of respective resolutions, to the respective persons therein named : and that they shall be published in all the daily papers of this city.

Jewish Missionary is Stoned LOUIS BUNKER ROUGHLY HANDED BY A MOB

Louis Bunker, a missionary from New York, will be confined to his room at the Moody Institute for the next few days as a result of the rough treatment at which he received from a crowd of excited Hebrews last night at Fourteenth and Halsted Streets.

Mr. Bunker, who is a converted Jew, has for some months past been holding meetings in a hall at No. 588 South Halsted Street, endeavoring to induce the people the people of his race, with which the neighborhood is thickly settled, to abandon their belief in certain portions of the Talmud, which he holds to be objectionable. He denies that he is attempting to Christianize the Jews, saying that he wishes them to adhere to Judaism, but asking them to remove their hostility to the gentiles.

Wednesday night he preached on "The Day of Atonement," thinking that the subject would be appropriate to the Jewish New Year's holidays. He said

his sermon gave satisfaction, although it was mainly an attack on the Talmud. There must at least have been one of the auditors to whom the discourse was not pleasing, judging from the missionary's experience last night. The experience is best described in Mr. Bunker's own words.

"I went over last night," he said, "to call on Rev. Mr. Chalmers under whose direction I am holding these missionary meetings. As I was coming home, walking along Halsted Street, near Fourteenth, I was accosted by a man who cursed me and used very vile language. I asked him why he insulted me, and he told me had heard me preach, and that I did not speak the truth. There were a number of Jews on the street, men, women, and children, for the feast of Yom Kippur was over, and a crowd was soon attracted by this noisy talk. Mr. Chalmers, who witnessed the attack on me, came to my assistance, and I turned to take a street car. Stones and mud were thrown at me. One of the stones struck me in the back, and I felt great pain for its effects. What surprises me is that during the excitement no public officer appeared. I believe that my unjust assailant was intoxicated and that the crowd attacked me without really knowing what it was doing."

Mr. Bunker will resume his missionary labors on South Halsted Street as soon as he is able. Until last night's incident he says he has always received courteous treatment from those among whom he works. Daily Inter Ocean [Chicago] - 1896-09-19

Married Sailors Snag Two Racing Titles

Teamwork is important in marriage. Nobody knows it better than Mary Ann and Terry Bunker, both 33 of Little Rock. Knowing how to work together won them two titles in international sailing competition this summer.

The Bunkers won the California State Championship in a 16-foot catamaran class in early August in Long Beach against 100 other boats. In the same week of competition, the pair came in a close second in the Prindle National Championship against 95 other boats.

"Placing second in the nationals was a big accomplishment," said Terry, a physical therapist at Health South Rehabilitation. "Teams from 20 states and eight countries competed this year. The team that beat us was the one from Chile that won last year.

"I started sailing on freshwater. I got my first catamaran in 1981. My wife and I met in Columbus, GA. She had a catamaran, too. In 1982, we moved here and started sailing Lake Maumelle [8,900-acre lake in Arkansas]. Four years ago, we started competing.

"This year we won the regionals," he said. "Teams from Arkansas, Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas compete for that title."

"When we entered the California State Championship race, we really did it to practice for the nationals," Mary Ann said. "We were competing with three other boats in that one."

"In the nationals, we didn't expect to even to be in competition with the team from Chile, "she said. "We set a goal to beat the team from New Mexico, and we stayed ahead of them most of the way.

"We were even near the Chilean team at the finish," she said. 'They were super. We felt lucky to make it close.'

"We got good starts in all our races," Terry said. "If your start is not good, you're dead. There were 23 boats in the 16-foot class. You really have to be in the top five at the start or you get lost in the pack and keep falling back." Teamwork is the key to winning and the Bunkers know how to get the job done.

"There's lots of stress in the boat, " Mary Ann said. "He's the skipper, and I'm the crew. The crew gives the skipper information about the weather, other boats and what's around them.

"Sometimes he'd be asking me, and I'll say, 'I don't know why. Why don't you look for yourself?' "But really, he's an excellent skipper," she said. All the stress is forgotten after the race. We recently read a book about teamwork on a boat, and that really helped.

"Generally, it works out great for us to work together on a boat. In fact, you see more man-woman teams then two-man teams now. I think a man and woman can really work best as a team."

"The races are intense, pure physical activity," Terry said. "You start sailing at noon and aren't off the water until 5 or 5:30 in the afternoon.

"We're lucky that we have help with the children when we do such exhausting activity," he said. We have a baby sitter who goes with us to watch the kids while we're on the water." The Bunkers have two children, Lindsey, 4, and Nathan, 2.

"We had other good support, too," said Mary Ann. "David Sample towed our boat and his all the way to California so we could fly."

The Bunkers said they planned to keep on going like the wind as they looked forward to their next regatta. Arkansas Democrat - 1988-09-28

"Navigating Cancer is improving the lives of millions of cancer patients while simultaneously growing into a strong business that is creating career opportunities for our team and improved performance for our oncology customers," Bunker said. "I found this overall combination very unique, and I couldn't resist the opportunity to become part of the team here."

Alternatively, some folks prefer to allow the list manager (that's me) to manually subscribe them. You can send me an e-mail request, and I'll add you. This list provider is used to electronically deliver the PDF version of the Banner, and notices of events of interest.

As you may recall, we have pared the print distribution of the Banner (eliminating mailings to long lapsed members and moving libraries to electronic distribution), thus allowing for substantial savings. Currently we distribute about 75 printed copies of the *Bunker Banner* by mail, and deliver about 65 copies to members and libraries electronically. We are grateful for having postage paid by an anonymous donor.

Electronic distribution of the *Bunker Banner* has grown slightly, and current membership fees allow us to accommodate growth in electronic distribution. I am also happy to work with any member who has trouble getting files electronically.

Genealogist/Historian

BFA data in several different files, and some are duplicated in one or more files. The information is kept in the cloud where both I and Doug Detling have access. I also try to transfer it to a USB drive frequently so there is a hard backup as well.

Devon database contains 18,573 individuals

Bedfordshire database contains 9,005 individuals **French database** contains 94 individuals including Bon Coeurs.

UK database contains 9,862 individuals some of which are also in the Bedfordshire file.

The Original database contains 35,179 individuals many of which are duplicated in the Bedfordshire and Devon database. This database contains all the Bunkers we have not been able to connect to Devon or Bedfordshire as well as the descendants of Chang and Eng Bunker.

Total individuals listed in BFA files equals 72,713. When I get a query I search each file for the individual or the nearest ancestor I can find for whom they have data. I then update the file and prepare a report for the person who contacted me. For non-members I provide a pedigree which only contains information about birth and death dates and places and the spouses. For members of the BFA I provide a report that gives all the information and sources we have. These reports are typically over 100 pages long.

I also help BFA members in any way I can with their research. I have been doing genealogical research for nearly 70 years (yes I started as a teenager), and I am frequently able to direct people to sources they have **2592**

never heard of where they are able to find more information.

I monitor the BFA Facebook page and answer questions there, and try to upload pictures and other information that might be of interest.

Research newspapers for articles about Bunkers and send them to gil to be published in the *Bunker Banner*. Usually when I find something I also need to update the file for that person. I also do that whenever we get an obituary.

Administer the DNA Bunker surname project at Family Tree DNA.

WILLIAM H. BUNKER 1938-2023

William Hudson Bunker ("Bill") died of cancer on April 18, 2023. He was 85. Perhaps even more than his many passions and noteworthy achievements, the true testament to Bill's greatness was reflected by his diverse group of friends. His ability to embrace so many people, and viewpoints different from his own, was connected to his deep curiosity about the big questions. He loved a thoughtful conversation and all things that might spark one, including op-eds from the *New York Times, Far Side* comics by Gary Larson, and a vast array of YouTube videos, documentaries, and classic films.

Bill was an anesthesiologist and an avid hobbyist astronomer and Astro-photographer. He enjoyed the pursuit of noteworthy astronomical events around the world, including a wonderful trip near Bend, Oregon, in August 2017 to share the experience of a total solar eclipse with family and friends. He planned the trip two years in advance with his wife, Darleen, even scouting out the perfect spot that would offer an optimal view without the crowds. Happily, on the morning of the eclipse, the sky was clear! It was an unforgettable event, as rare and special as Bill himself.

Born in 1938 in Columbia, Missouri, he was the fourth child of Margaret and Herbert Bunker. He graduated from the University of Missouri in 1960 with a BS in Physics and a commission as a second lieutenant in the Army Artillery. After six months on active duty at the Army's Artillery School at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, he was hired by the U.S. Weather Bureau to work as a technician at Hallett Station in Antarctica from October 1961 to February 1963. Today, that adventure is commemorated by *Bunker Bluff* on the west wall of Mariner Glacier, a landmark bestowed by the Advisory Committee on Antarctic Names.

After his adventure at the South Pole, Bill returned to the University of Missouri to earn an MS in Physiology in 1965 and an MD degree in 1970. His intern year was served at St. John's Mercy Hospital in St. Louis, followed by the anesthesia training program at Virginia Mason Hospital in Seattle. In 1973 he entered private practice with an anesthesia group in south Seattle and in 1975 joined the anesthesia group at Overlake Hospital in Bellevue, Washington until 1998.

Once retired, Bill moved with Darleen to Birch Bay, north of Bellingham, where he pursued his many hobbies, which in addition to star gazing, included his great love for classical music and enjoying his incredible record collection. He created beautiful stained-glass windows, constructed a home theater and a backyard observatory, and enjoyed roasting his own coffee blend.
