Do Siblings Have the Same DNA?

DNA defines who we are. It determines our physical characteristics, like our hair and eye color, and height. Scientists even estimate that our genetic code plays a role in our temperament.

Many siblings who take ancestry tests wonder if their DNA results will be the same because they share parents and have the same ancestry background. That brings us to the critical question: "Do siblings have the same DNA?"

The answer is no. You will have similarities, but even twins have some differences in their DNA. Truthfully, scientists have yet to understand everything related to how the letters within your DNA work. It's still an area of science with a lot to discover.

Let's discuss what you can expect to see within sibling DNA test results and how DNA in siblings works.

Family Ancestry vs. DNA

Everyone in the world receives their DNA makeup from their parents. You receive 50% of those letters within your DNA from one parent and 50% from the other. Which letters are passed down to your children is entirely random.

There are four possible letters within your genes, each standing for a different amino acid that makes you, you.

Not all letters will get passed down, but here's the kicker. Just because you are missing a specific part of the genetic code of one parent doesn't mean an earlier ancestor did not have that letter.

Interestingly, although everyone has some link to their ancestors from thousands of years ago, the gene pool becomes more varied as time goes on.

Do Siblings Have the Same Ancestry?

Siblings mostly have the same ancestry. Your genes are still from the same pool of potential letters.

But can full siblings have different ancestry? Technically, yes. Since you only acquire 50% of the genes from your parents, it's perfectly plausible that two siblings may have a different ancestry.

Ethnicity also plays a role. If you have both German and Hungarian in your family tree, one sibling may receive the genetic markers indicating German and the other Hungarian. It's why someone's DNA test result can differ from their sibling's result.

Do Siblings Have the Same DNA?

Due to the recombination process during the fertilization of the egg and throughout pregnancy, siblings do show differences. Figuring out why siblings' DNA can be different is relatively easy: because each time reproduction happens, the child will receive a different combination of letters (50% from each parent).

It's estimated that siblings share roughly 50% of the same DNA. Biological siblings will always have the same family tree, but their genetic code will differ. That also applies to fraternal twins.

The one exception to the rule is the case of identical twins. Do siblings with the same parents have the same DNA, even if they are born simultaneously? Identical twins share a much higher percentage of DNA because they come from the same egg cell.

Yet even in this scenario, identical twins growing in the womb will still have some differences in their DNA. Unlike siblings, who may have varying physical characteristics, identical twins may only show differences in their temperaments and personalities.

How Does DNA in Siblings Work?

Is it possible for siblings to have different DNA? The reason why brothers and sisters will show different DNA test results is due to meiosis. This process is a type of cell division that creates gametes. These cells are haploid, meaning they contain a single copy of each chromosome to ensure that your children receive only a single set of genes from you.

A mere 23 chromosome sets can yield eight million possible DNA combinations, which is why humans are so diverse. So, will siblings have the same DNA test results? The chances of two children receiving the same sets of chromosomes from each parent are nearly impossible. (cont. page 2552)

There is a phenomenon known as chromosomal crossover to further mix up the gene pool. When diploid cells become haploids (in the form of sperm or egg cells), chromosome pairs may cross over, exchanging different pieces.

Think of it as one giant jigsaw puzzle to increase diversity within the human species. Scientists believe this occurs to reduce the risk of inherited genetic disease.

Note that when someone asks, "Can two siblings have different ethnic DNA?" and the answer is that siblings share 50% of genes, this is not meant in terms of all DNA. Instead, scientists are referring to the tiny differences within all genes.

In most cases, differences between genes are mainly irrelevant and don't manifest bodily or mentally.

Sibling DNA & Ancestry FAQs

The issue of sibling DNA can be a complex one to understand. To help you grasp the subject better, here's some clarification to commonly asked questions about sibling DNA.

Can brothers and sisters have different DNA and ethnicity?

Yes, because of the meiosis and chromosome crossover processes. The ethnicity of two siblings can also differ for this reason. One person's DNA result may indicate more Swedish in their genes, whereas their sibling may have more Irish. Naturally, it largely depends on how much geographical diversity there is in your family tree.

Can a DNA test prove siblings?

DNA testing is used every day to prove a family relationship. Scientists will examine your DNA to spot the similarities and differences between your and your sibling's samples. The general rule is that a full sibling will share roughly 50% of DNA. On the other hand, a half-sibling will have approximately 25% of DNA. The technology behind DNA testing is incredible and has brought closure to families worldwide.

Do unrelated people share the same DNA? Humans have so much diversity when compared to members of the animal kingdom. Humans are so different from animals because we have more potential DNA combinations. Vast gene pools are crucial to the continuing advancement of the human race. Everyone shares a lot of similarities in their DNA. After all, humans share all the major chromosomes. What makes us different is how the letters within are combined.

Do family members born of incest share more DNA? Inbreeding will undoubtedly lead to family members sharing more of their DNA. In this scenario, children born of incest will share more than 50% of their DNA with their parents.

Inbreeding has a high chance of leading to genetic disease. One of the most famous genetic conditions is the Habsburg Jaw, likely due to inbreeding within the Habsburg royal family that dominated Europe in the 17th century.

Mother of Cheaper by the Dozen Dies

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) – "When my husband first told me he wanted to have six sons and six daughters, I asked how on earth anybody could have 12 children and continue a career, " Dr. Lillian M. Gilbreth once recalled.

"But my husband said, 'We teach management, so we shall have to practice it.'

"Over a 17-year period, we had our children – all planned, I assure you.

A chronicle of the family life of Frank and Lillian Gilbreth and their 12 children – written by a son and daughter – became a best-seller and eventually was filmed, starring Clifton Webb and Myrna Loy. Appropriately, it was entitled "Cheaper by the Dozen."

Mrs. Gilbreth, who died Sunday at the age of 93, married Frank Bunker Gilbreth in Boston in 1904 and together they pioneered in the field of time and motion study, the development of more efficient job operation.

"Cheaper by the Dozen" was a humorous account of how the Gilbreths applied their field to the running of their 14-member family.

The authors were Ernestine Gilbreth Carey and Frank Jr; now assistant publisher of two Charleston, SC dailies.

Mrs. Gilbreth died at a nursing home where she had been confined for the past three years after falling and breaking a hip at Mrs. Carey's home.

REED CITY - CARL BUNKER, JR., 2-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Bunker, of Reed City R2 drowned in a stock watering tank of his parents' farm about 2 p. m. Wednesday. (cont nx pg) Reed City state police reported Carl and a neighbor child were playing in the yard when the accident happened. They said the boy's friend ran to Mrs. Bunker at 5:05 p.m. to tell her Carl had fallen into the tank.

Mrs. Bunker found her son in the 9x4x3-foot tank. Artificial respiration failed and Mrs. Bunker drove the boy to the state police post here. Troopers then rushed him to Reed City hospital where he was pronounced.

State police believe Carl climbed the ladder on the windmill, then tumbled into the tank. Coroner James W. Livingston of Reed City issued a verdict of accidental drowning.

Mrs. Bunker and the children walked about a quarter of a mile to a neighbor's home to turn in the alarm and escape the frigid weather. Her husband is a produce truck driver and was in Florida when the fire broke out.

Stolen Horse is Lawyer's Fee

(By Kist News Bureau)

BLUFFTON, Feb. 3 - Local officers acting with the Marion PD, have just discovered that Attorney John Milliner, of Wabash, seven years ago innocently accepted a stolen horse as a fee for defending **OSCAR BUNKER**, now under arrest at Marion as the leader of a gang of horse thieves which was recently rounded up and with whom William and James Byrd, two Wells County men, were connected. Bunker was under arrest for stealing hides to the value of \$12.

Mr. Milliner defended him and received a fine gray horse, with harness and buggy in lieu of a fee. He kept the horse for a time and finally sold it. It died a few years ago after being resold several times. The officers are not able to say from whom the horse was stolen although they are positive that Bunker had not right to it.

State Liquor Agent's "Court Fight"

H. F. BUNKER and Carl Schmidt, state liquor agents, were bound over to the district court on a charge of assault and forced to give bonds for \$500 each to insure their keeping the peace for thirty days after a hearing before Justice Collins yesterday.

Bunker and Schmidt were arrested on complaint filed by Attorney W. N. Jamieson just as Bunker was about to be called to testify in a case Monday afternoon. Jamieson testified that he had been interrupted Monday morning while he was in police court on which Bunker was a state's witness.

State Agents Found Guilty in Assault Case

Sentences of 30 Days Each Imposed by Justice Collins.
Placed Under Bonds to Keep Peace.

HAROLD F. BUNKER and Carl Schmidt, Jr., deputy state agents working under Gus A. Hyers, were found guilty Wednesday afternoon in Justice George S. Collins' court on charges of provoking an assault on William Jamieson, an attorney.

Sentences of 30 days each were imposed, and they were each placed under bonds to keep the peace. Appeal bonds arranged by Special State Prosecutor Yale C. Holland were filed on behalf of the defendants.

Mr. Jamieson testified that during the trial of a liquor in the police court Bunker said to Schmidt and Claude Vogel, "What he needs is a good punch in the nose," referring to Jamieson, whereupon the witness further testified he was rushed by the trio. Vogel is a former deputy state agent.

Evidence disclosed the fact that Bunker and Schmidt carry badges and revolvers but are not bonded.

Ship Wreck Valencia – 1906

VICTORIA, B. C. – Jan 25 – Of the 154 persons on board the steamer *Valencia* when she was wrecked on the rock five miles from Cape Beale Monday night, only 38 have thus far been saved, 12 passengers and 23 members of the crew.

Five sailors and a mate were the first to reach shore and gave the warning. Nine sailors and passengers later succeeded in making land near the scene of the wreck. The other twenty were rescued from a raft in the high sea by the steamer *City of Topeka*.

The dead number 119, the greatest loss of life in the North Pacific since the *Pacific* was lost in 1875.

The *Valencia*, in whose rigging about 30 persons were clinging frantically, waving for assistance which could not be given when the steamer *Queen* left the scene yesterday noon, broke up last night, sweeping to death those few who had survived the terrible horrors of privation, chilled to the limit of human endurance, by clouds of spray which swept over them.

The fifteen survivors, in addition to the twenty rescued from the raft are: **E. F. BUNKER,** Carl Samuel, Miss Hono, R. Brown, Thomas Shields, J. R. Campbell, Richley Faganto, J.T. McCarthy, B. N. Ledhos, Albert Wells, John Mark, W. Goslin, T. Lampson, C. Brown.

The steamer *City of Topeka* left Port Angeles at 5 o'clock to return to the scene of the wreck.

FEAR INDIANS MAY DESPOIL BODIES OF DEAD

Frank F. Bunker Appeals to the Dominion Governor and the Pacific Coast Company (unreadable)
ATTEMPTS TO BRING OFF TEN OF THE DEAD TO REVENUE CUTTER FAIL DUE TO HEAVY SURF Dory From Tug Also Unsuccessful in Attempt to Get Corpses and Canoes to Be Used Times Special Service

BAMFIELD B. C. Saturday, Jan 27 - Indians are congregating upon the beach about the scene of the wreck of the *Valencia* and unless some steps are taken at once to prevent it will at once begin the work of robbing the bodies which are washing ashore. I have appealed to the Dominion government and the Pacific Coast **2555**

Company to establish a competent patrol of the beach and have volunteered to head a party if sufficient men and provisions are provided. Until that is done, I must remain at Bamfield.

My companions who sought shelter with me at the Darling River but have been taken on board the revenue cutter *Grant* by Capt. Killgore, since our arrival here on Friday night are now on their way to Seattle.

Today the *Grant* left Bamfield for the scene of the wreck to take aboard the ten bodies recovered at that point. A ship's boat in which I was taken ran the surf but found that it was impractical to bring off the bodies by this means.

A tug sent by the Pacific Coast Company arrived and one of her dories undertook the same task and failed.

A plan was undertaken to obtain Indians to bring out the bodies in canoes; they were accustomed to the surf.

I am trying to organize a systematic patrol to gather up the bodies, as they wash ashore at widely scattered points and may continue to do so for a week.

BAMFIELD B. C. Saturday Jan 27 – I managed to land a party on the beach today with the assistance of a dory from the United States revenue cutter *Grant*. We met Frank Bunker, and he informed me that there were ten bodies on the beach; no women were among them.

A strong breeze is coming up at the time this message is being sent. The *Grant* has returned to Seattle and the tug *Bahada* is at Bayfield tonight. Tomorrow an effort will be made to reach shore and procure the bodies.

If I cannot get to land because of bad weather, I will return to Bamfield and organize a crew of Indians and commence a systematic search for bodies along the shore line of the island. If I find that is impossible to get enough Indians at Bamfield I shall proceed to Neah Bay on the *Bahada*, to secure them at that point.

Capt. Patterson is port captain of the Pacific Coast Steamship Company and one of the best known, navigators on the coast. He has been on the Nome run for several years but was recently promoted. He was on the steamer *City of Topeka* Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday when the survivors were rescued, and a search made along the dangerous Vancouver Island coast for more victims of the wreck. Capt. Patterson left Seattle Friday night on the tug *Bahada* and will remain in the vicinity of Bamfield to direct a search for the bodies of the dead.

A Wrong Turn

Meanwhile, the nine survivors, led by Frank F. Bunker discovered the Carmanah-Cape Beale telephone line strung in the trees on top of the bluff. Believing the *Valencia* had run aground on the Washington Coast, they decided to turn left (toward Cape Flattery) for help.

Had the Bunker Party turned right and traveled a short distance, they could have received a lifeline shot from the Lyle line-throwing gun. The *Valencia's* stern was fewer than 250 feet from the top of the cliff and a breeches buoy could have been rigged, rescuing the remaining passengers and crew.

The Bunker Party followed the telephone line with great difficulty through the dense forest and across swollen streams, eventually arriving at a lineman's shack on the west side of the Darling River about 2:00 p.m. While searching for food, Frank Bunker found a telephone and connected it to the circuit. After repeated failures, he finally established communications with the Carmanah Light Station, giving the outside world the first news of the disaster. Carmanah relayed the information to Bamfield, who then cabled the information to Victoria, B.C. The *Valencia* had been on the reef for 15 hours and it would be many more hours before rescue vessels arrived.

E. C. BUNKER

Pioneer Who Brought Body of Crawford Home Revisits City, Here First Time since 1898, Tells of Thrilling Days When Geronimo Was Raiding Territory

"Well, I'll be back in ten, fifteen or twenty years." It was E. C. Bunker, old timer from Clifton. Arizona who was in town yesterday as a witness in Federal Court, the first time he has been in Tucson since 1898 although he has been in Arizona almost continuously since 1882.

Bunker came to Arizona from Wyoming as a civilian transportation man with the 3rd Calvary. The wagon train of which he was in charge came to Fort Thomas on the Gila between Globe and Safford.

For three years he handled wagon train transportation for the army during the height of the Indian uprisings. In 1885 there was another outbreak and Bunker took charge of a pack outfit which followed the army through its campaigns, from Fort Apache on the north in the headwaters of the Yaqui River in the Sierra Madres of Old Mexico.

"Yes, I combed the Sierra Madres on both sides and on the top looking for the old chief," Bunker explained in outlining some of the historical campaigns in which he took part.

The aging eyes grow bright in memory of some trips which carried him through the deserts and mountains of Arizona. One in particular stood out as a journey of giants. Captain Crawford had been killed far down in Mexico in a battle with Apache warriors. The soldier had been buried near where he fell.

Six months later it was decided to bring the body to the United States for final disposal. Bunker had charge of a pack train which handled the job. With an undertaker, they made the trip down without incident and secured the body. There was no board within many miles of which a coffin mighty be made. A framer of poles was constructed and lined with canvas. The body was placed in the makeshift container and the whole had to be strapped to a mule's back for the 200-mile trip.

Four of the best pack animals had been picked from a bunch of 200. One of these mules, Bunker recalled had at one time packed 1000 pounds on a bet. The rude casket was transferred from one animal to the other, and finally arrived safely at its destination after a trip over mountain trails which were all but impossible.

But Geronimo was captured and the work of the park division of the army became routine pounding of roads and trails without the excitement and danger which had made the old days something to remember. In 1892, Bunker went to work for the Arizona Copper Company.

In 1898 he made a trip to Tucson to look for a business location. He landed in town during a great fiesta, where the men from the frontier assembled in a week of revelry as relaxation from the loneliness of lonely jobs.

Snowmobilers With Authority

OCONOMEWOC – Three helmeted snowmobilers zoom down snow-covered trains and across ice-covered Okauchee Lake, but unlike others, they carry guns and badges. Their black vehicles carry large white lettering that reads: Sheriff.

The aim of these officers, and the other nine members of the Waukesha County Sheriff's Department, is to make the sport safer and to enforce state snowmobiler regulations, said Sgt. **DAVID C. BUNKER.**

"It's not a lot of fun to stop somebody and say, 'I know you're having a nice day and here's a \$56 ticket because you didn't register your snowmobile. It's a negative kind of work but [must] be done."

SAIGON (AP) – "His" embassy has an armed helicopter on the roof and a tank parked in the driveway of the official residence.

"Hers" has a cow asleep in the doorway under the great seal of the United States, and from the terrace of the official residence, a breathtaking view of the snow-covered Himalayan range.

The husband-and-wife team, **ELLSWORTH BUNKER** and his wife, **CAROL LAISE BUNKER**.

We've read many stories about Ellsworth's adventures and nothing about Carol's escapades, until now. Bette

Eighteen hundred miles west of Saigon in the medieval city of Katmandu, Ambassador Carol Bunker

presides over a rambling collection of two-story, white-washed buildings on King's Way. Formerly a factory, it now houses the official link to Nepal. It's the land of Sherpas and Gurkhas and lofty peaks like Everest. Nepal remains aloof and neutral and prefers to be loved by everyone. Tibet incorporated into Red China on the northern border and India is west and south.

Madam Ambassador entered government service with the Civil Service Commission in 1940. She went overseas after the war as a personnel officer of UNRRA and moved to the State Department a few years later. She rose in a field dominated by men, was steady and often spectacular. She served as advisor to several U.N. delegations and to UNESCO, first secretary-political secretary actually - to the embassy at New Delhi, director of the State Department's Office of South Asian Affairs and country director for India, Ceylon, Nepal, and the Maldives. President Johnson, in July 1966, nominated her to the post of career minister, the second highest rank in the State Department, and appointed her ambassador to Nepal in August 1966.

In her first two years as ambassador, Carol Laise Bunker won friends for America among the Himalayan people by taking the United States out of capital construction aid work, the "high visible projects" like roads and factories that Chinese and Russians compete in, and instead concentrated on malaria eradication, improved agriculture techniques, developing hydroelectric productivity and training teachers, vocational school instructors and government officials at local level.

Bunker's first wife, Harriet Allen Bunker, died in 1964. Three years later in a quiet ceremony at the official residence at Katmandu the ambassador-at-large married the bachelor career girl who had been his first secretary when he was ambassador to India and who held concurrent accreditations as ambassador to Nepal.

For a wedding gift, she gave him a Nepalese prayer wheel. He, in a daring thrust, gave his bride a cookbook. The wedding party set out by Jeep for Tiger Tops; a wild game preserve operated by a Texan in government-owned land in the dense jungles 75 miles west of the Nepalese capital. Enroute, they almost collided with a one-horned rhinoceros and her baby who appeared around a sudden curve in the narrow roadway. Two months after the wedding, Bunker accepted the President's appointment as ambassador to South Vietnam.

"At least we're serving on the continent," said Madam Ambassador with wifely resignation. Exchanging visits between Katmandu and Saigon, they managed to see each other every few months. Saigon, under rocket or terrorist attack, she has yet to be whisked off to "Bunker's bunker."

To avoid confusion, she signs official communiques as Ambassador Laise, he signs as Ambassador Bunker.

"In addition to national cemeteries and state, tribal and territorial Veterans, the National Cemetery Administration provides headstones or markers to eligible Veterans in private and municipal cemeteries. These government-furnished headstones and markers remain Federal property; the purpose of this page is to provide information on how to safely clean them.

"The goal of cleaning is to remove air pollution soiling, lichen, bird droppings, diet, salt, and sap – it is NOT to make the headstone or marker look 'like new.'

"Improper or unnecessary cleaning can accelerate the deterioration of marble or granite; preserving pre-1970s bronze was not sealed and will have a blue-green patina that will not be removed by cleaning.

"VA prohibits the general public from power washing Government-furnished headstones and markers due to the damage it may cause to historical headstones."

DAVID DOUGLAS BUNKER 1935-2021

Dave Bunker died of a heart attack on Thursday morning, March 18, 2021. He was the last person to think it was his time to leave us. He was energetically preparing for another decade or more of work before him.

David Douglas Bunker was an amazingly talented musician, a genius inventor, and, most importantly, a loving brother, father, and grandfather. He passed away March 18, 2021, at age 86 in Rocky Ridge, Utah. Dave had an extraordinary life and lived it to the fullest on his own terms until his very last day.

Dave was born to Joseph Laurence Bunker and Winnifred Ella Fuller-Bunker on January 3, 1935, in the small town of Bunker Creek, Washington. He was the third of five children: Joanne Bunker-McReynolds, Allen Bunker, Lois Bunker-Woods, and Steven Bunker.

Dave learned the art of woodworking and became a luthier at an early age working side by side with his father building his first violin. Dave went on to form numerous successful guitar companies over his lifetime and continued to be an innovator in his field throughout his entire life. One of his greatest accomplishments was his invention of "The Touch

Guitar" which was the second patented string instrument in the United States. He was respected and admired by professionals across all genres of the music industry.

Dave was a bonafide performer. Early in his career he had the great privilege to entertain at military bases around the globe. One of the highlights in Dave's career was performing at the Grand Ole Opry in the late 1950's. He went on to share the stage at the Golden Nugget in Las Vegas with his band the Dave Bunker Show, and the likes of Johnny Cash, Merle Haggard, and Waylon Jennings for over a decade. Herbie Mandrell and his daughters also played a significant role in his life during Dave's Vegas years.

Later in life, Dave's focus shifted from performing to perfecting the art of guitar building with much success. He manufactured guitar necks for Ibanez with his patented tension free necks. Eager to try his hand at another part of the guitar business, Dave went on to buy and sell exotic tone woods to manufacturers around the world. In his final years, he formed "Stump to Stage" which showed his guitar building process full circle: literally from the tree to the final product. Dave moved to Utah from Washington State three years ago to continue his legacy with his son.

Although *The Touch Guitar* was his passion, his love for his family was unsurpassed. Dave's enthusiasm for life was infectious, and he did not know a stranger. He left a positive mark on all lives he touched. In life, Dave was surrounded by love, and, in turn, he spent his life fiercely loving his family and friends.

He is survived by his sister Joanne Bunker-McReynolds, his brother Steven Bunker, his former wife (and friend of sixty significantly plus years) Reita Jackson-Collins and their three children: David Laurence Bunker Sr., Teresa Jo Bunker-Reinholz, and Brenda Renee Bunker-Olson and their respective spouses. He was blessed by twenty-seven grandchildren, and thirty-five great grandchildren (with four on the way). He lived a humble life, unaffected by just how significantly he impacted the world. He will be greatly missed by all but his legacy lives on through those he left behind.

How do you say good-bye to someone you loved your entire life? Yes, the matriarch of our family is gone, and even though she disliked the title, my 95-year-old sister wanted, more than anything, me to be the patriarch. I thought she would outlive the entire family, even me.

She died in surgery on November 10th, complications from a broken hip. Now I'm the last one standing and completely understand my sister's dislike as the family doyenne. I don't like it, either.

BJ lived her last year with a daughter in sunny Cape May, NJ, but missed her home and friends at the Colonial Park Apartments in Woodbury, NJ. She was active in the building affairs, involved in politics, and worked the polls.

My sister was born 20 Aug 1927 to William Henry Bunker (1901-1943) and Edith Wooters *Schaeffer* (1905-1990) who married in 1926. She was the first of five children, her siblings, all brothers were William Henry Jr (1929-2006), Robert Samuel (1930-2013) and Roy Edgar (1938-2017).

The *paterfamilias* was born in February 1935. Mom was the only one allowed to call me Gilbert, it was usually when I did something bad. I can still hear her summoning words, *Gilbert, Roy, come down here and bring the belt with you.* I disliked the name, even though I was named after a favored uncle, Gilbert Edward Wilson.

BJ married William Edward Purnell on 26 Nov 1947 at our home on Woodland Avenue in West Philadelphia. I was 11-years-old at the time and remember the day vividly, with BJ gliding down the stairs, a short march to the dining room and the reverend uniting them as husband and wife.

They had four children: Dorothy Linda (m James Maurice Sullivan, Jr.), Shirley Diane (m Charles Joseph Taylor), William Edward Jr. (m Martha Marie *Freudlich*) and Judith Karen (m Steven Scott Boyer). As time progressed, there would be thirteen grandchildren (sixteen if you count stepgrandkids), twenty-one great grandchildren, another enroute.

One of my sister's happiest days was her annual birthday and pool party hosted by my son John and his wife Grace, in Deptford, NJ. Bunkers would gather from all over including Pennsylvania, Arizona, and Florida. Most arrived from south Jersey - her kids did not settle far from home. The pool was a cacophony of chaos. A blistering sun was braved. The cuisine was copious. Forty to fifty celebrants was the norm.

A memorial service on November 18th was a joyous affair, everyone received a smiley face pin to festoon on a scarf or lapel. Two collages of photographs decorated the space, one with BJ cuddling each grandchild and great grandchild, shortly after their birth. Two short services by the VFW and American Legion Auxiliary preceded eulogies by the youngest daughter and several grandchildren, interspaced by musical renditions. There followed a memorial of mummers, a tribute BJ's South Philadelphia roots and the famous tradition of the "Mummer's Strut" on New Years' Days. Many of the bereaved joined in the strut, it was a perfect ending to the celebration.

Sis would have enjoyed the entire salute to her life, and now, it's my turn!

A handsome soldier came home from World War II after serving Hawaii, Philippines, and Okinawa to his home in South Philly.

While teaching Sunday School at Moore St. Baptist Church he was purposely introduced to a cute young lady, a set-up between his older sister and her mother. It worked pretty-well because they were married in 1947 and became "Bet and Bill." Settling first in South Philly, then across the bridge to Camden and then raising their four children in Westville, NJ.

Bet was a homemaker and began her lifelong service to the community. Starting in 1955 as a Brownie Leader, Girl Scout Leader, neighborhood chairperson of Girl Scouts, Assistant Cub Scout Leader, and Secretary of Westville PTA, all revolved around children.

While living in Friendly Village in Williamstown [NJ] she became a Democratic Committeewoman and President of the Village Homeowners Association. After her beloved Bill passed away, she moved to Colonial Park Apartments in Woodbury, where she resided for 30 years. There she became president of the Park's Senior Social Club. She was also Chaplain of the American Legion Auxiliary Unit 137 in Woodbury. She was appointed by the Gloucester County Housing Authority as Residential Commissioner and served 20 years (2000-2020).
