Devonshire Bunker Research

Editor's Note:

BFA Genealogist Bette Richards recently commissioned some research on the origins of the Devonshire Bunkers, particularly James Bunker. Following the receipt of two reports, the first covered in this issue of the Banner, Bette concluded: "I believe we are stuck with not really knowing more about our James Bunker. I think she [researcher Lucy Browne] is done with any records being found in Devon and do not believe there will be much, if anything in London. All we have is sources checked without success. The guess that James was the one baptized in Slapton has never sat right with me. Just like the Jane Godfrey Bunker of Nantucket. Both of these are assumptions with no basis in records and cannot even be helped with elimination of all other possibilities."

The following summarizes the first of two reports (combined 10 pages in length). The second report will be included in the November *Bunker Banner*. If any member would like further information on this research, please contact Bette.

Searches for evidence of Bunker family members in Devon prior to the 18th Century with specific reference to the parishes of Blackawton, Rattery and Slapton.

Introduction

Searches were carried out in the Devon Archives at Sowton Industrial Estate, Bittern Road, Exeter, concentrating on the parishes of Slapton, Rattery and Blackawton, as per the client's remit. However, where indexes were quick to search, references in other parishes were also noted, as these might direct future searching. The searches included indexes, transcriptions of name lists and original documents. In the time available, the most potentially useful sources were selected, although there are more manorial records which might be seen for Blackawton, which has a good collection in the Devon Archives. Slapton has records archived around the country, and genealogists in Suffolk and Wiltshire might carry out searches for this project, while Cornwall could be covered by Lucy Browne Genealogy. There are no surviving manorial records for Rattery before the 18th century.

Etymology

In order not to miss any Bunker family members whose names might be spelt in an unexpected way, the origins of the name and its variants were checked in standard surname dictionaries:

Dictionary of Surnames by Patrick Hanks and Flavia Hodges (OUP 1988): BUNKER Norman nickname for a reliable or good-hearted person, Old French "bon" meaning "good" and "cuer" meaning "heart", from the Latin "cor" (consider also French "coeur"). Names linked in French and Italian are BONCOEUR (French) and BONCORE (Italian).

A Dictionary of English and Welsh Surnames by Charles Waring Bardsley (London, revised 1901) found the spelling variant BUNCKER in parish registers and marriage licenses, also LE BONQUER and LE BONCER.

The Internet Surname Database

(www.surnamedb.com) finds Bunker cognate with the English surname Goodheart/Goodhart.

Devon database which includes descendants of James Bunker of New Hampshire and the Rattery, England Bunker descendants – 18,605

The original database contains 35,216 names many of which are duplicates of the Bedfordshire and Devon Bunkers. This database contains the names of Bonkers, Bunkers we cannot connect to the Bedfordshire or Devon Bunkers, German Bunkers, Dutch Bunkers, Irish and French Bunkers. It also contains the descendants of Chang and Eng Bunker.

BFA Secretary's Annual Report

This is a combined report for duties of the Secretary, website coordinator, and temporary editor of the Bunker Banner.

The Association currently has 117 members, including 57 Life Members (33 of whom receive printed copies of the Banner by mail). Fourteen libraries across the country receive electronic editions of the Banner. To save money, we no longer mail Banners to genealogy libraries.

The Burnett Morris Index of Devon Places and Names

The Burnett Morris index, currently housed in the Devon Archives, is described on the website of the Devonshire Association (https://devonassoc.org.uk). It is a comprehensive card index created by Reginald Burnett Morris between 1914 and 1942, which includes a vast collection of references to Devon places, names and dialect items, recorded on slips of paper and organised into 424 drawer boxes. The sources range across around 7 centuries, including original and published records.

Burnett Morris included BUNCKER and BOUNCKER under Bunker. All the references selected for this report are pre-18th century. No references were seen pre-dating 1600. While each reference was on a separate slip, they have been amalgamated here for easier interpretation, and their sources explained.

Bouncker, John of Churstow. Will dated 1613, proved 1613 in the consistory court of Exeter. Mother, Alice Bouncker, brothers, Stephen and Thomas Bouncker, cozen Margaret Bouncker, wife Elizabeth, executor, witnesses Robert and Thomas Bouncker

Mentioned in the Will of John Leigh 1616:

Elizabeth Buncker, widow of John Buncker, Robert Buncker deceased, Thomas Buncker, wife Honor

NB a "waiter and searcher" was an official responsible for customs duties, with work including inspecting and searching ships and cargo to prevent smuggling and ensure that all goods were properly declared and taxed.

Primary Sources

Rattery Manor Rental 1777 ref. Devon Heritage Centre (DHC) 2756M/DZ/T/3) was searched. This document is in good condition and written in a clear hand. No Bunker was seen in list of tenants or names of "lives" (A "lease for lives" was usually for the lives of three specified people e.g, 'during the natural lives of the said A aged about 65 years, his son B aged about 20 years and his daughter C aged about 18 years, and for the natural life of the survivor or longest liver of them'. Thus the property ideally remained in the family for a long time, since each time one of the 'lives' died, the lease was surrendered and demised again to another three lives).

Slapton Manorial Court Roll 1661 ref. DHC CR/1472 1473). This is a typewritten transcription. No Bunker seen in list of tenants or names of "lives".

Slapton lists of manorial tenants for 1664 and 1669 - 1673 ref DHC 4652MM/13 NRA 33755 Reynell. This document is in good condition in a clear hand. No Bunker seen.

Court Roll for the Manor of Blackawton 1578 – 79 ref DHC CR 20020: A clear hand, but very small abbreviated Latin script. Names were searched for in the text. Juries were in identifiable blocks. No Bunkers were seen.

Court Roll for the Manor of Blackawton 1599 - 1600 ref DHC CR 20026: Very flimsy and incomplete. Was withdrawn after examination as unfit for production.

Court Roll for the Manor of Blackawton 1619 - 1620 ref DHC CR 20029: Fragile and incomplete – torn and has holes. Abbreviated Latin. Not able to decipher in the time available.

Deed of Partition 7-8 November 1751 ref

48/12/39/1 naming Goodman, Skinner and Bunker and their wives. Deed of partition of lands in Cornworthy. This was selected as a 17th century Chancery case concerning James Bunker and lands in Cornworthy was seen in the National Archive Catalogue (see below), and a James Bunker was known by the client [Bette Richards] to have emigrated to the USA.

The deed included the following information: the names of Edward Bunker of Totnes, saddler and Jane his wife, formerly (in a recited or quoted deed

of 1749) Jane Wakeham of Cornworthy, spinster. Mary Goodman and Dorothy Skinner also named were sisters of Jane and all three were co-heirs of Samuel Wakeham of Cornworthy, their late deceased brother, who was the son and heir of Samuel Wakeham. The property was described in Cornworthy, identified by the land and owners neighbouring it. No other Bunker genealogical information was include. The record concerned the Wakeham family property divided between the three sisters of Samuel Wakeham.

Parish Records

A quick survey was made of surviving parish records, and registers which might not be included online.

Blackawton: Only mid-18th century onwards survives for overseers of the poor, and 19th century vestry minutes, churchwardens accounts and rates and valuations.

Early Bishops Transcripts (copies of parish registers sent annually to the Bishop) include the dates 1597 1603, 1609, 1614-1615, 1617-1618, 1627, 1641 and 1663 for mid-17th century and earlier. Images of these are available on microfilm and should be checked if online research hasn't included them. DEX/7/d/1/Blackawton/EBT.

Very little survives for **Rattery**, and only late 18th century onwards for account books. Registration record survival for Rattery begins in 1653, but the Devon & Cornwall Record Society register transcription has some earlier entries from Bishops Transcripts and these were checked. Two records were found in the time available: Wyllyam Bunker and Dorythye Gordyn married 14th August 1609 and Wyllyam Bunker son of Gregory baptised 28th June 1609. Available on microfilm are images of the years 1609, 1614, 1618, 1630, 1631, 1641, 1663-1666 and 1668. (ref DHC DEX/7/d/1/Rattery/EBT)

Surviving parish poor law, vestry and churchwarden records for **Slapton** date from the 19th century. Surviving registers for Slapton run from 1634, but like Rattery, some earlier BT entries survive for 1606, 1608, 1610, 1612-1615, 1617, 1620, 1623, 1632, 1634, 1636, 1641 and 1669 and these should be checked with more time. (ref DHC DEX/7/d/1/Slapton/EBT).

Only three volumes are published so far, and only Blackawton is included from the parishes of interest. However, as the volumes are indexed, all three were checked as per Burnett Morris including Bouncher, Bunker and Buncker.

For reference and future research, a search was made for items archived in the National Archives for *Buncker* OR *Bunker* AND *Devon* between 1500 and 1699. There were no results for 1700 – 1799.

The following index entries were found for Chancery records and considered of interest to this project. They include bills of complaint (setting out the details of a dispute) and answers (the defendants' response to all the points raised in the bill of complaint). They might contain genealogical information and link the parties to identifiable property. It would be worth having these examined. i) C 10/466/30 Date: 1657

Lucy Browne's Conclusion

There are enough 16th and 17th century references to BUNKER to justify further searches and attempt to draw together some of the groups. All probate material should be seen, and any early parish registers not yet examined by the BFA genealogist. A search on Discovery also suggested that there are property records to be seen which might include further genealogical information.

Note: These will the subject of the second report for the November *Bunker Banner*.
